The truth about Whipped Peter (Gordan) is that he tried to kill his wife. The Plantation Overseer, usually a black man, as most Plantation Overseers were Black men, whipped Peter Gordon severely. When the Master found out, he fired the overseer. Later, Whipped Peter escaped to the Union North, and the Army saw the Scars on Whipped Peter as a great propaganda tool against Slavery, hence the infamous photo.
